Nikki Salzillo planned to be a politician to help people.

She's now a president — of a bank instead of a country — yet she's still able to reach toward her altruistic goal.

The Austin market president of Bank of America Corp., Salzillo is also the manager of philanthropy for the bank. That puts her in charge of a foundation focused on community outreach and workforce development.

Salzillo initially worked as a broker with investment house Shearson Lehman Brothers in Washington, D.C. However, to get closer to customers, she joined Bank of America in the

She has since risen up the ranks, becoming Austin market president in 2013.

In her free time, Salzillo prefers to be outdoors and riding horses.

At first blush, banking may seem an unlikely business for a once-aspiring politician. But Salzillo said it has provided her with the tools to accomplish what she could do in public office.

"What I really wanted was a job where I could use resources to help people in need," she said.

What kind of boss are you? One of the things about my role is I manage by influence I really try to create a sense of vision and where we want to be going.

What makes you happy? I'm a pretty optimistic person so a lot of things make me happy. Mainly, having challenges makes me happy, and being outside in nature, spending a lot of time hiking and riding horses.
